Overview of Course: The purpose of this course is to introduce students to forensic psychology. Forensic psychology refers broadly to the research and application of psychological knowledge to the justice system. The course covers such topics as police selection, discretion, and stress; police interrogations; false confessions; criminal profiling; detecting deception; eyewitness identification, and jury selection. Other topics include fitness to stand trial; psychological testimony; predictions of violent behaviour; violent offenders; the insanity defence; sentencing; and ethical issues in psychology and the law. The content of this course provides an excellent background for students majoring in or pursuing careers in social work, counselling, clinical psychology, political science, law enforcement, and criminology.

Course Requirements: You are responsible for all material discussed in the lectures and the material in the assigned sections of the textbook. It is important to come to class, as some of the lecture material may not be in the textbook. Please make use of office hours and class time to ask questions about the readings.

Evaluation: Course grades will be determined on the basis of your performance on two mid-term exams and a final exam. The mid-term exams are worth 25% each (50% of your final grade). The final exam is worth 50% of your final grade. The final exam is NOT cumulative.
